- 5. What analogy does Paine use to describe the current relationship between the colonies and England? Why does he say this is a problem?
- 6. How does Paine challenge those individuals in the colonies that still feel that reconciliation is possible?
- 7. Cite two examples that Paine outlines as disadvantage of remaining a colony to England.
- 8. Why does Paine believe that God is on the side of those who favor separating from England? Cite two examples.
- 9. How does Paine describe the individuals who claim to support reconciliation?
- 10. According to Paine, why does the distance between the colonies and England justify separation?
- 11. What evidence does Paine offer that the relationship with England "reverses the common order of nature"?
