The Federalist aka The Federalist Papers

- Written by John Jay, James Madison, and Alexander Hamilton under the name "Publius"
- Published in New York
- 85 articles in support of ratification of the Constitution
- Most famous are Federalist No. 10 and No. 51
- Instrumental in gaining support for ratification.
- Become the cornerstone for understanding the purpose of meaning of the Constitution.

Key Ideas You Need to Remember

- What is Federalism?
 - Division of power between a national government and local governments.
- What is a republic?
 - When a smaller governing body makes decisions in the best interest of a large group of citizens that they represent.
- What is a democracy (direct democracy)?
 - When all citizens vote on all issues for themselves serving their own interests.
- What is a faction?
 - A small group of individuals that are self serving to protect their own interests.
