Why use an ISN?

- Organization
 - All your materials for class are in 1 place
- Personalized learning
 - Different learning styles
- Identify daily objective
- Acquisition of information (right side)
- Application of information (left side)
- Synthesis of information (summary)

Parts of the ISN

- Title page
- Table of contents
- Right side teacher or "input" side
- Left side student or "reflection" side
- Summary 1 paragraph synthesizing the information you learned from the lesson.
 - NOT a retelling of daily activities

Right Side

- Objective (TSW), title, and date
- Organized set of information for all students provided by the teacher.
- Testable information
- Examples
 - Notes
 - Guided readings
 - Vocabulary
 - Video questions
 - Primary documents and analysis worksheets
 - Other teacher assigned work

Left Side

- Student side
- Student generated work that represents the main idea or objective of the lesson.
- Examples:
 - Illustrations, cartoons, graphs, charts, graphic organizers, diary entries, songs, poems, ect.

Summary

- Bottom ¼ of left side
- Analysis or synthesis of the days lesson
- NOT a retelling of the day's activities!

Required Materials for ISN

- 8.5x11 spiral notebook (Mead 5 star)
 - Fits full size sheets of paper
- Colored pencils or crayons (NO MARKERS)
- Glue sticks to attach papers
- Highlighters

How is the ISN Graded

- 25 points for a completed right and left side as well as a thorough summary.
- 15 points for ISN with minor missing work
- 0 for an incomplete right and left side
- Students may earn back partial credit if completed ISN entry is turned in within 24 hours of initial due date
- May use "Life Happens" pass on ISN's

Diary Entry Dear Diary,




Summery

Doolittle Do'd It!

James Doolittle and his crew successfully bombed the Japanese city of Tokyo. It is America's first air raid on American soil and the American people have proven that we will no longer stay back and allow the Japanese to rule the pacific. Japan must pay for the American lives lost in this war! And for the destruction of Hawaii's Pearl Harbor. The raid was held on April 18, 1942. "The Objective of the raid

was to lower Japanese confidence and lift American moral." States crew leader Lieutenant colonel James Doolittle. The planes used in the raid were aircraft carriers called Hornets. Doolittle was awarded the Medal of Honor due to his valiant leadership during the war in the pacific, and has become one of the pioneers of aviation. (Read more Pg. 5)
