Washington's Presidency

THE NEW NATION

JUDICIARY ACT OF 1789

- Added structure to the judicial branch
 - + 5 Supreme Court justices and 1 chief justice
 - + 5 Federal circuit courts
 - + 13 Federal district courts
 - + State courts could appeal to federal courts

WASHINGTON'S CABINET

- Cabinet presidential advisors
- Secretary of State (foreign affairs)
 - + Thomas Jefferson
- Secretary of War (military affairs)
 - + Henry Knox
- Secretary of Treasury (financial affairs)
 - + Alexander Hamilton

ALEXANDER HAMILTON

- × Federalist
- Favored a strong central government
- Ruled by an elite wealthy class
- Loose interpretation of the Constitution
- National government would take on the debts of the states
- Favored the creation of a national bank
- Supported by New Englanders, manufactures, landowners, investors, lawyers

THOMAS JEFFERSON

- Democratic Republican
- Distrusted a strong central government & the rich
- Believed in strong state and local governments rooted in popular participation
- Strict interpretation of the Constitution
- Disliked the national bank
- Favored an agrarian based economy
- Southerners, farmers, tradesmen

NATIONAL BANK

- Proposed by Alexander Hamilton
- Funded by the national government and wealthy investors
- Handle tax receipts (imports/exports) and other government funds
- Print paper money
- Federalists favored the plan, Democratic Republican opposed.
- Compromise: Dem. Reps. agree to the bank if the Federalist agree to move the new capital of the nation closer to the South so it would be more responsive to their needs.

WHISKEY REBELLION

- Protective tariff import tax on goods produced in Europe
- Excise tax tax on the production, sale, or distribution of a good.
- Hamilton places an excise tax on whiskey
- Whiskey was a cash crop for trans Appalachian farmers who were poor
- × Farmers rebel against the new tax
- Washington leads militia into the backcountry to put down the rebellion with a 15,000 man army
- Shows the power and authority of the new federal government to put down a revolt
- Washington pardons most of the rebels, welcomes them back into the fold.

WASHINGTON'S FAREWELL

- Farewell address printed in newspapers around the country.
- Warns Americans of two things:
 - + Avoid entangling foreign alliances
 - + Avoid political parties as they are destructive to national unity.
- Retires from public life and finally returns to his home at Mount Vernon in Virginia
